Organization	Address	Amount Requested	Description
<b>Army Corps of Engineers</b>	New York District Jacob K. Javits Federal Building, 26 Federal Plaza, Room 2109, New, NY 10278	\$300,000	Improvements to seawall on the main artery which is currently insufficient to protect roadway from storms and hightides. Without addressing these weaknesses, there would be the potential for loss or interruption of roadway access for first responders and emergency access to over 2,000 individuals.
<b>Central Islip Civic Council, Inc</b>	PO Box 219 Central Islip, NY 11722	\$200,000	The funds will be used for the revitalization and redevelopment of foreclosed properties through a coordinated community outreach effort in a region devastated by the mortgage crisis. The funding will provide for renovations to vacant homes in the community and restoration of these homes for affordable housing.
<b>Cold Spring Harbor Laboratory &amp; Brookhaven National Laboratory</b>	One Bungtown Road Cold Spring Harbor NY 11724	\$5,000,000	Funding will support critical research and equipment costs for genetic and metabolic analyses aimed at improving oil production in duckweed species. This funding will speed up the development of viable biofuel alternatives to fossil fuels and support this critical advanced energy resource on Long Island.

<b>Economic Opportunity Council</b>	Save Our Children Coalition 14 South 20th Street Wyandanch, NY 11798	\$300,000	This funding will found the Wyandanch Youth Resource Center, whose primary goal is to address the needs of targeted at-risk students and their families with after school programs for crime and violence prevention. It will include a Summer Institute to address the learning needs of students, a Mentor program to provide role models for participants and a Parent Education Initiative to ensure the child's success.
<b>Fire Island Land Trust</b>	250 Lawrence Hill Road, Cold Spring Harbor, NY 11724	\$250,000	Stabilization and rehabilitation of two historic buildings on Fire Island owned by the National Park Service by the Fire Island Land Trust and in a collaborative conservation partnership.
<b>Friends of Wertheim National Wildlife Refuge</b>	PO Box 376 Brookhaven, NY 11719	\$1,135,000	Funding will be used to build and equip the Visitor Learning Center/Administrative Facility of Long Island National Wildlife Refuge Complex. The Phase I funding being requested will be for site work, A/E services and regional engineering services.
<b>Gerald J. Ryan Outreach Center</b>	1434 Straight Path, Wyandanch, NY 11798	\$100,000	The Gerald J. Ryan summer camp in Wyandanch provides a safe and instructive environment for local kids and teenagers. The camp employs 20 teens from the local area, who serve as tutors and counselors for the summer and fall.
<b>Have a Heart Children's Cancer Society</b>	164 Main Street, Huntington, NY 11743	\$100,000	Funds will be used to help cover the financial needs of struggling families who have children diagnosed with cancer. This organization allows parents to focus their attention on their child's treatment and recovery.

<b>Hispanic Counseling Center</b>	344 Fulton Avenue, Hempsread, NY 11550 and 1322 Fifth Avenue, Bay Shore, NY 11706	\$200,000	These funds will help provide mental health services to the uninsured and underinsured Hispanic population on Long Island. Proper prevention will help ease the strain on local emergency rooms and reduce the long term effects of mental health problems.
<b>Hunter Squires Jackson American Legion Post 1218</b>	133 Dixon Avenue, Amityville, NY 11701	\$60,000	This funding will provide for vital structural improvements to the American Legion Post building in order to maintain its structural integrity and to incorporate "green technology" during the retrofitting process. The goal is to install a new reinforced flat roof which will replace the original flat roof and to install solar panels after installation of the new reinforced roof; and to retrofit the building's interior lighting and HVAC system. The building for Post 1218 has been designated as a village emergency shelter for evacuated and displaced persons in the event of a natural disaster or catastrophic event such as a devastating hurricane or Tsunami. Therefore, it is imperative that the structural repairs on the roof are made before the next hurricane season.
<b>Huntington Breast Cancer Action Coalition</b>	746 New York Avenue, 2nd flr., Huntington, NY 11743	\$100,000	The coalition works with 4 partner breast cancer groups (who serve 17 counties) to provide evidence-based knowledge to diverse/underserved populations of all ages & backgrounds on how to reduce risks of cancer & optimize their health.

<b>Huntington Community Development Agency</b>	100 Main Street, Suite 309, Huntington, NY 11743.	\$250,000	The funding will be used for interior renovations including energy efficiency retrofits to the Huntington Business Incubator that assists small minority businesses during the critical start up period and beyond with office space, business plans accounting and marketing support.
<b>Island Harvest</b>	199 2nd Street, Mineola, New York 11501	\$125,000	Island Harvest collects good surplus food from area retailers, wholesalers and manufacturers and distributes them free of charge to food pantries and soup kitchens. This funding will underwrite the costs of transporting donated food to Long Island-based food pantries, soup kitchens and other feeding programs.
<b>Long Island Forum for Technology</b>	DHS Manufacturing Technology Center of Excellence in Bethpage, NY	\$6,000,000	Funds will be used to continue a DHS program to identify/transition advanced technologies in the homeland security industrial base. This will improve/reduce costs of products delivered to first responders.

<b>Long Island Gay and Lesbian Youth (LIGALY)</b>	34 Park Avenue, Bay Shore, NY 11706	\$500,000	The Anti-Violence Project - Long Island (AVP-LI) program will provide assistance for all victims of hate and bias crimes on Long Island through a unique collaboration with organizations serving individuals historically victimized by these crimes. Through this federal appropriation, AVP-LI will expand by building community coalitions, increase support for victims and survivors, better document incidences of hate and bias crimes and enhance training for service providers and law enforcement personnel.
<b>Long Island Power Authority</b>	333 Earle Ovington Blvd, Uniondale, NY 11553	\$3,000,000	The interest was overwhelming in LIPA's RFP for 50 mW with over 400 MW of proposals incorporating photovoltaic arrays to be installed on commercial and municipal rooftops, along parking lots, atop landfills, and at brownfield sites. With this funding, LIPA can administer the installation of solar energy systems across Long Island without any additional cost to consumers. These installations can be put on municipal buildings like schools, fire departments and local government buildings.
<b>Long Island Univeristy</b>	700 Northern Boulevard, Brookville, NY 11548	\$1,800,000	Funds will be used to provide outreach to high school students in underserved areas through intense mentoring, education, and support. These students will in turn serve their communities by becoming teachers in underserved communities across Long Island.

<b>Mothers Against Drunk Driving Long Island</b>	33 Walt Whitman Road, Huntington Station, NY 11746	\$65,000	With over 300 volunteers already involved, this funding will support a volunteer coordinator responsible for coordinating their activites, training and growth. It is our goal to have a "Community Champion" for MADD-LI in every zip code and this position will make that happen.
<b>New York State Division of Military and Naval Affairs</b>	330 Old Niskayuna Rd, Latham NY, 12110-2224	N/A	We are requesting that the New York National Guard be added to the Federal Transit Security Grant Program. This change will be to support transportation security operations being performed by the Joint Task Force Empire Shield.
<b>New York State Division of Military and Naval Affairs</b>	330 Old Niskayuna Rd, Latham NY, 12110-2224	\$7,200,00	This money will fund construction of facilities for a new military unit. The 105th Airlift Wing has been selected for a new unit and mission, a Base Defense Group which will require a facility to house greater than 200 personnel and extensive equipment and supplies. Present Security Forces Squadron has only 4,572 square feet of space but is authorized 14,000 to house this new unit.
<b>North Shore Long Island Jewish Health System</b>	125 Community Drive, Great Neck, NY 11042	\$300,000	These funds will be used to create a data interchange and communications infrastructure to allow sharing of patient information and communication. This will provide a much needed boost to their HIT infrastructure, which will lead to improved care and a reduction in medical errors.

<b>Office of Manhattan Borough President</b>	1 Center street, 19th floor south, NY, NY 10007	\$500,000	In order to decrease dependence on gas used to transport food from distant areas and encourage healthy eating, funding will be used to conduct an in-depth examination of the local food production capacity of the New York City Metro Region, including Long Island.
<b>Parent's for Megan's Law</b>	1320 Stony Brook Road Suite 201 Stony Brook, New York 11790	\$500,000	The Sex Offender Registration Tips (SORT) and Support Programs will provide the public with two interactive resources, a Helpline and a Website, for confidentially reporting sex offenders failing to comply with registration and supervision requirements and other criminal activities. After tip analysis and identification, leads are forwarded to local, state and federal law enforcement. The program assists law enforcement and other criminal justice agencies and all victims of violent crime.
<b>Postpartum Resource Center of New York</b>	109 Udall Road, West Islip, NY 11795	\$100,000	Funds will be used to expand their outreach services, which include prevention and early detection programs, support groups, and a 24/7 multilingual helpline. Each year, over 50,000 women and girls are affected in New York. These programs help lead to early diagnosis and proper treatment.

<b>State University of New York (SUNY) at Albany</b>	State University of New York at Albany College of Nanoscale Science and Engineering (CNSE) NanoFab 300 South, 255 Fuller Road, Albany, NY 12203	\$1,000,000	The New York Center for National Competitiveness in Nanoscale Characterization, also known as (NC)3, will support the commercialization of nanoscale measurement methods and equipment. Funding for (NC)3 will also support research and development of new nanoscale measurement strategies for energy related materials and devices including solar cells, solid state lighting, optical sensors for harsh environments, fuel cells and energy storage devices.
<b>Suffolk County Community College</b>	Crooked Hill Road, Brentwood, NY 11717	\$300,000	This funding will support a Green Jobs and Small Business Incubator for the predominantly Latino community in which Suffolk County Community College is located. The program will train area youth in the skills needed to compete for Green Jobs and advise small start-up businesses in their earliest stages so they may survive to success.
<b>The Auschwitz Institute for Peace and Reconciliation and Fort Leavenworth's Combined Arms Center</b>	870 Fifth Avenue, Suite 9H, New York, NY 10065 and Fort Leavenworth KS	\$5,000,000	The Raphael Lemkin Center for Genocide Prevention teaches a 7 day course on Genocide Prevention to U.S. and International military students of the Combined Arms Center.
<b>The Myositis Association</b>	1233 20th St, NW, Suite 402, Washington DC, 20036	\$1,250,000	Funding is for a joint academic and research partnership to investigate the association of exposure to environmental toxins to the development of myositis in members of the military and first responders

<b>The Village of Saltaire</b>	PO Box 5551, Bayshore, NY 11706	\$280,000	This funding will used to rehabilitate 120 feet of the extensively deteriorated part of the bulkhead at the Bayshore side. The bulkhead separates and protects the Bayshore terminal from the Great South Bay. The Village has already undertaken and completed the reconstruction of 420 feet of the worst section of the bulkhead. The remaining 120 feet of bulkhead, that has not been renovated shows a serious deteriorating condition to the point that material is rapidly escaping and undermining the ferry terminal. Additionally, the ferry terminal is the only access point for all of the Saltaire residents and visitors.
<b>Thomas Hartman Foundation for Parkinson's Research</b>	72 West Main Street East Islip, NY 11730	\$150,000	Funds will be used to study innovative techniques for treating/curing Parkinson's disease. The foundation is working with scientists who have developed promising approaches towards finding a cure.
<b>Village of Ocean Beach</b>	PO Box 457, Ocean Beach, NY 11770	\$1,390,000	The purpose of this project is to replace an aging ferry terminal, elevate the structure to relieve a major flooding problem, provide a more comprehensive and well planned Boat House for the above stated purposes, and most emphatically, to repost the entire foundations of the ferry terminal marina. At the same time, this project addresses a more feasible traffic flow for thousand of riders and the reconstruction of freight and storage facilities.
